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Lantern Theater Company to Serve as Host Theater for Fox Fellowship Recipient Bi Jean Ngo

Theatre Communications Group (TCG) has awarded a Fox Foundation Resident Actor Fellowship to Philadelphia actress Bi Jean Ngo and an associated Host Theatre Award to Lantern Theater Company.

The Fox Foundation Resident Actor Fellowships are designed to support actors in their artistic and professional growth in collaboration with a TCG Member theatre through two initiatives: Extraordinary Potential and Distinguished Achievement. The goals of the Fox Foundation Resident Actor Fellowships are: to further an actor's artistic and professional development; to deepen and enrich his/her relationship with a not-for-profit theatre; to ensure his/her continued professional commitment to live theatre; and to encourage actors to work outside their comfort zone. Ngo is receiving this award in the category of Extraordinary Potential, aimed at helping early to mid-career actors who have completed their training within the last fifteen years. Ngo will receive \$15,000, with an additional \$10,000 available to relieve student loan debt. As the host theater, the Lantern will receive \$7,500 to be applied to costs incurred due to the actor's residency activities.

According to the TCG website, through this Fellowship, Ngo will study classical text and voice through Linklater workshops as well as stage combat, Elizabethan dance, and movement during a month-long intensive workshop at the Shakespeare & Company in Lenox, MA. She'll also take part in a three-week workshop at Dell'Arte International in the summer of 2017, where she will learn mask, clown, and how to devise theatre through physical movement. Afterward, she'll teach both the classical and contemporary text and movement skills to her peers and mentees of the Philadelphia Asian Performing Artists Group, under the auspices of the Lantern Theater Company. Her plan is to be a vanguard for diverse representation onstage not only in Philadelphia, but in other regions. Her goal is to use her exposure to influence more leading theatre companies to choose plays written by Asians, featuring Asian actors, and directed by Asians, as well

as to create and act in plays that reflect her own ethnic experience and the stories of her immediate community. By acquiring facility with classical theatre from Shakespeare & Company, Bi will be better equipped to add her voice to the company's classical repertoire which is routinely performed throughout the region. The masterclasses that she will conduct after each residency will provide vital training opportunities for emerging Asian performers, helping to give them work and empower their creative voices.

Ngo has worked in the Lantern's *Illumination* program since 2012 where she has taught both After School Activities Programs teacher training and served as an in-school teaching artist for residency programs. In May 2015, she performed as part of a live presentation entitled *Funny, Sad, True and Mad: A Theatrical Exploration of the Medical Life*, for an audience of over 100 students, staff, and community members at the Sidney Kimmel Medical College as part of *The Empathy Project,* a unique partnership between the Lantern and Thomas Jefferson University. This spring she will make her Lantern mainstage debut in *36 Views*. Ngo is excited to collaborate with the Lantern through this Fellowship, stating: "I wanted to work with the Lantern for several reasons. First, the theater is working on creating a more diverse and inclusive environment. The artistic director and staff have a history of mentorship and supporting local talent, and they do great classical theater which is an interest of mine. This seemed like the perfect moment for me and the Lantern to form a forward-thinking partnership."

Ngo is only the third Philadelphia artist to be awarded this Fellowship. Past local recipients include Jennifer Kidwell and Gabriel Quinn Bauriedel, both affiliated with Pig Iron Theatre Company. Other notable past recipients include André De Shields, John Douglas Thompson and F. Murray Abraham, all of whom won "Distinguished Achievement" awards.

The William & Eva Fox Foundation was established in 1987 by Belle Fox in honor of her parents, who founded the Fox Film Corporation. The Foundation has awarded more than \$3 million in fellowships to 335 actors since 1994. The Fox Foundation is the largest U.S. grant maker dedicated to the artistic and professional development of theatre actors, and one of very few that provides direct financial support to individual actors.
