LANTERN THEATER COMPANY PRESENTS WILLIAM SHAKESPEARE'S JOYFUL, MUSIC-FILLED AS YOU LIKE IT TO WELCOME SPRING!

Lantern Theater Company will present William Shakespeare's *As You Like It*, directed by the Lantern's Artistic Director Charles McMahon, from March 10 – April 17, 2016.

As You Like It is the story of Rosalind – Shakespeare's most magnetic and vivid heroine. Oppressed, threatened, and exiled from her life at court by her envious uncle Duke Frederick, Rosalind escapes with her cousin into the wild and unpredictable Forest of Arden. Disguised as a boy, she is able to create a world of her own, reveling in the newfound independence that life offers when freed from court and corset. But chance encounters with the love-struck Orlando, who has followed Rosalind into the woods, complicate this new life. Winding through the enchanting thickets of the forest, will true love find its way? Can one desire too much of a good thing? Find out in this wondrous comedy that celebrates redemption, family, and the liberating power of love.

Lantern Theater Company has made a commitment to produce Shakespeare every season. It is our conviction that these works have a unique place in our cultural and artistic heritage, and that they promote empathy in audiences of all ages. Though his plays are more than 400 years old, we aspire to present these works with crackling urgency and excitement as William Shakespeare's writing transmits essential human knowledge, urgency, and experience to our own age.

ABOUT THE CAST AND PRODUCTION TEAM

A perfect fit for the Lantern's intimate space and vivid performance style, *As You Like It* is a play of uplifting energy and urgency. It represents a mix of Shakespeare's finest high and low comedy – from the genius word play of the famous speech on the "Seven Ages of Man" to the absurd physical comedy of cross-dressing and getting hopelessly lost in the woods – balanced with a compelling story of self-discovery. This piece provides dynamic roles for young actors,

particularly Rosalind, played by Lantern newcomer **Liz Filios**, and her lover Orlando, played by Lantern veteran **Jake Blouch**.

Liz Filios lends significant musical experience to the Lantern stage for this production, in which **Michael Hahn's** sound design highlights the charm and romance of the play's scripted musical interludes. An established musical theater actress in Philadelphia, Filios recently appeared as Fosca in *Passion* at the Arden (2015 Barrymore Award for Outstanding Leading Actress in a Musical) and Cinderella in *Into the Woods* at Theater Horizon (2015 Barrymore Award for Outstanding Ensemble in a Musical). She is the recipient of the 2014 F. Otto Haas Award for an Emerging Philadelphia Theatre Artist and the 2014 Barrymore Award for Outstanding Leading Actress in a Musical for *Midsummer [A Play with Songs]* at Inis Nua Theatre Company. Charles McMahon states: "We are thrilled to welcome Liz to the Lantern with *As You Like It*. Classical Shakespeare will mark a significant divergence from much of the theater work she has done in Philadelphia, though Liz is certainly experienced with the artistic elements of love, laughter, and music, which are essential to the storytelling of this piece and the character of Rosalind. She is an ideal performer to capture the spirit and genius of Shakespeare's most captivating heroine."

Jake Blouch has previously appeared at the Lantern in *A Skull in Connemara, Emma, The Liar, New Jerusalem, Henry V* and *Romeo and Juliet*. Locally Jake has appeared performed with Theatre Exile, Iron Age, Act II, People's Light, the Arden, the Wilma, BRAT Productions, Simpatico Theatre Project, Philadelphia Artists' Collective, and Delaware Shakespeare Festival. Blouch is also an established musician, headlining as "Ricky Lake Jackson," the lead singer of local southern rock band **Jawbone Junction** (alongside other Lantern veterans Damon Bonetti, Sarah Gliko, and Charlie DelMarcelle).

Chris Anthony (Charles/Silvius/Ensemble) opened this season at the Lantern in *Photograph 51*. Kirk Wendell Brown (Duke Senior/Duke Frederick/Ensemble) was most recently seen at the Lantern as Simon in Athol Fugard's *The Train Driver*. J Hernandez (Touchstone/Ensemble) returns following his recent portrayal of Petruchio in *Taming of the Shrew*. Frank X (Jaques/Ensemble) has appeared many times at the Lantern, including in *King Lear, Othello, Romeo and Juliet*, and *The Island*. Adam Altman (Oliver/Ensemble) was most recently seen at the Lantern in *Julius Caesar*. Rounding out the cast are Meghan Winch (Phebe/Ensemble) and Ruby Wolf (Celia/Ensemble), who make their Lantern debuts with this production.

Director Charles McMahon is the co-founder and Artistic Director of the Lantern. He has directed all but one of the company's Shakespeare productions over the past 20 years, beginning with *All's Well That Ends Well* in the 1996/97 season. He has been nominated twice for the Barrymore Award for Excellence in Theatre for Outstanding Direction of a Play: in 2006 for *Richard III* and in 2004 for *The Comedy of Errors*. McMahon also directed the Lantern's best-selling production, *New Jerusalem...* by David Ives, and he acted in many of the company's early productions, including *Rosencrantz and Guildenstern Are Dead* by Tom Stoppard, *Copenhagen* by Michael Frayn, and *Waiting for Godot* by Samuel Beckett. He directed the world premiere of his new translation of *La Ronde* by Arthur Schnitzler and he cocreated the world premiere adaptation of the Dylan Thomas poem *A Child's Christmas in Wales*, which went on to receive

five Barrymore Award nominations including the Independence Award for Outstanding New Play. Most recently, McMahon penned the Lantern's world premiere production of *Oscar Wilde: From the Depths*.

The Lantern's Production Manager **Meghan Jones** (*Photograph 51, Hound of the Baskervilles, Arcadia*) will design the set. Costumes will be designed by **Janus Stefanowicz** (*Photograph 51, Doubt, Arcadia*). **Drew Billiau** (*Henry V, A Midsummer Night's Dream, The Train Driver*) will handle the lighting design.
