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Lantern Theater Company Joins Theaters Nationwide in Presenting One Night Only Reading of Sarah Ruhl's *The Oldest Boy* on Monday, April 26, 2016 at 7 p.m.

Benefit reading to support the Emergency Earthquake Relief Fund of the Tibet Fund

PHILADELPHIA (April 6, 2016) – Lantern Theater Company will be the local site for a multi-city play reading series of *The Oldest Boy* by Pulitzer Prize finalist and Tony Award-nominated playwright Sarah Ruhl. The Lantern will produce the reading with support from PAPA (Philadelphia Asian Performing Artists) on Monday, April 25, 2016 at 7 p.m. at St. Stephen's Church at 19 S. 10th St. in Center City. The confirmed cast includes Justin Jain and Geneviève Perrier with others to be announced; local actress/educator Bi Jean Ngo will direct. Tickets are free, but reservations are recommended. Donations are welcome in advance or at the door, with all proceeds going to the Emergency Earthquake Relief Fund of the Tibet Fund.

In this moving and delightful exploration of motherhood, love, and letting go, *The Oldest Boy* follows an American mother whose young son is believed to be the reincarnation of a high Buddhist lama. When Tibetan monks arrive unexpectedly, asking to take her child away for a life of spiritual training in India, she and her Tibetan husband must make a life-altering choice that will test their faith – and their hearts. *The Hollywood Reporter* praised the play as "an extraordinary story with playful humor and unstinting compassion" and *Newsday* called it "bewitching, ingenious, and seriously moving." *The Oldest Boy* premiered at **Lincoln Center Theater**'s Mitzi E. Newhouse Theater in 2014.

"The Oldest Boy is a sensitive and eloquent story of a multi-ethnic American family struggling to reconcile Buddhist tradition and community with modern American culture," said Lantern Theater Company Artistic

Director **Charles McMahon**. "We welcome this opportunity to work with acclaimed playwright Sarah Ruhl and to commemorate the first anniversary of the Gorkha earthquake in an artistic and constructive way."

This multi-city reading series was spearheaded by Ruhl as a fundraising effort for the Earthquake Relief Fund of the Tibet Fund on the anniversary of the 7.8 magnitude Gorkha earthquake that shook Nepal on April 25, 2015. In addition to the Lantern, participating theaters include **Arena Stage** in Washington, D.C.; **Central Square Theater** in Boston; **Goodman Theatre** in Chicago; **Irondale Ensemble Theater** in Brooklyn, N.Y.; **Shaking the Tree Theatre** in Portland, Ore.; **Soulpepper Theatre Company** in Toronto, Ontario; and **Trinity Repertory Company** in collaboration with the URI Center for Nonviolence and the MFA in Playwriting Program at Brown University in Providence, R.I.

"I am so moved by how theaters are coming together to support a relief effort in Nepal. The news cycle is so terribly short, and so many people are still suffering in that part of the world," said Ruhl. "I'm so happy *The Oldest Boy* can be a very small part of reaching out to Tibetans affected by the earthquake in Nepal, and so grateful to the participating theaters for their generosity."

Bi Jean Ngo is an actress, theater educator, and a founding member and creative director of PAPA (Philadelphia Asian Performing Artists). She will make her Lantern stage debut in the Philadelphia premiere of *36 Views* by Naomi Iizuka, which begins previews on May 26, 2016.
